
Parent Ambassador Program: Assistance Survey

Tips for Traveling During the Holidays

The holiday season is a great time to make plans to travel outside of the United States or back to your home country; however, there are a few things you should know upon your return to school. Here are a couple of tips to keep in mind before you leave and upon your return to the United States.

Tip 1: It is important to have your school's most up-to-date contact information, including a weekend or 24-hour telephone emergency number.

Tip 2: Have all the necessary travel documents. When you enter the United States, you will arrive at a port of entry and meet with U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officers for primary and sometimes a secondary inspection (if the CBP officer at the port of entry cannot verify your information, or if you do not have all of the required documentation (see list below), you may be directed to an interview area known as "secondary inspection." Secondary inspection allows inspectors to conduct additional research in order to verify information without causing delays for other arriving passengers). The CBP officer may ask questions about your reason for travel and to inspect important documents like your:

- Passport
- Student Visa
- Form I-20, "Certificate of Eligibility for Nonimmigrant Status"
- *Be sure to hand-carry these items and do not put them in your checked baggage.

Under certain circumstances, the CBP officer may issue a Form I-515A "Notice to Student or Exchange Visitor," which authorizes temporary admission into the United States for 30 days while you obtain and submit necessary documentation to SEVP. Work with your school and your DSO without delay to submit the proper documentation required by the Form I-515A.

*Note: If you do not respond to a Form I-515A within 30 days, it will negatively affect your F1 status and you may be required to leave the United States.

Tip 3: Effective November 8, 2021 at 12:01am EST (5:01am GMT), before boarding a flight to the United States from another country, all air passengers – 2 years or older – are required to present a negative COVID-19 viral test.

- If you are fully vaccinated: Proof of vaccination and a negative COVID-19 test result taken no more than 3 days before travel.
- If you are not fully vaccinated: A negative COVID-19 test result taken no more than 1 day before travel.
