

What is a Jubilee Year?



The Church began celebrating the Jubilee Year again in the 14th century. Since then, it has become an important event in the Catholic calendar. Once held every 100 years, then every 50, Jubilee Years now happen every 25 years.

Jubilee Years are a time for special celebrations, pilgrimages, acts of penance, and most importantly, focusing on God's mercy and forgiveness.

The pope declares a Jubilee Year. During the Holy Year, Catholics are encouraged to renew their relationship with God through prayer, penance, and acts of kindness. Pilgrimages to holy places are encouraged, and people can receive indulgences, special graces from the Church that helps remove the punishment for sins that have already been forgiven. The Jubilee Year is a time for all Catholics to grow closer to God and to each other, remembering that God always offers us new beginnings!



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What is a Pilgrim?

Those traveling to celebrate the Jubilee in Rome are making a pilgrimage. Since ancient times, people of faith have been pilgrims. Recall the stories of Abraham, Moses, and the early Christians. A pilgrimage is a very special journey. Those making a pilgrimage prepare themselves both physically and spiritually.

- **St. Teresa of Ávila**—Known for her deep trust in God's guidance, she about the importance of hope in the spiritual journey. She believed that no matter the challenges, God's love and grace would always be there to lead us to peace.
- **St. Padre Pio**—A saint of great compassion and perseverance, he offered hope to those who struggled in faith. His life of prayer, suffering, and miracles reminds us that God is always with us, especially in difficult times.
- **St. Maximilian Kolbe**—In the face of extreme suffering in the Auschwitz concentration camp, he displayed profound hope. He gave his life to save another prisoner, showing that even in the darkest moments, love and hope can shine through.



- **St. Catherine of Siena**—St. Catherine was a powerful example of hope and trust in God, working to bring peace to the Church and the world. Her writings encourage us to hold onto hope and believe in God's plan, even when we face struggles.
- **St. John Paul II**—A saint who faced great personal suffering, including the assassination attempt on his life, he continually preached the message of hope, especially through his famous words, "*Be not afraid*." His faith and perseverance inspire hope for a brighter future.
